



## Truro Mayor: Passing the Flag to the County

A simple request to the town of Truro to fly the Pride flag during Pride of Pictou County turned into national news this past week. I met with Mayor Bill Mills and heard about his being sworn in on the Bible and how as a Christian man he did not feel it was something he should support. He said Council voted 6-1 against having the flag put up; the lone vote of support came from Diane Bennett-Cook, Councillor for Ward 1 in Truro.

I challenged Mayor Mills' belief that the Bible is very clear about homosexuality. He was firm in his conviction; at one point he even asked me if I had accepted Jesus Christ as my personal Saviour. In the end he was not willing to reconsider,

although he encouraged me to ask again next year and said that if we got our application in earlier we could have a public discussion on the topic at a Council meeting.

I then met with a reporter from the Truro Daily News, and later it occurred to me that many of us involved in Truro Pride actually live in Colchester County, not Truro itself, so I contacted Mike Smith, the mayor whose offices are just down the road from the Town of Truro offices. Mayor Smith was very supportive and did not hesitate to agree to fly the Pride Flag.

On Friday, August 3, the front page of the Truro Daily News had a picture of me and the Pride Flag along with the story of my

meeting with the Mayor. Sharon Farrell, a Truro resident, felt so much outrage about the issue that she formed a Facebook page to vent her frustration. The Facebook page quickly took off and, at the time I am writing this, has over 2100 members.

In one quote to the media, Mayor Bill Mills said that if we allowed a gay flag, what if someone asked to raise a flag in support of pedophiles, which added fuel to the fire and made it clear that Mayor Mills has no respect for the GLBT community. On Monday Truro held what was, to my knowledge, the first ever Pride Event in town, a rally in Victoria Park with more than 100 people. Speakers included myself, Sharon Farrell, Diane Ben-

## Annapolis Valley Health & Youth

This fall, Public Health Services, through the Annapolis Valley Health Authority and in partnership with Addiction & Mental Health Services and the Annapolis School Board, is launching the Youth Health Center Project. The two goals for this year-long project are:

1) The development of a multi-year implementation plan for the creation of new youth health centers located in various school and community settings through out the district and,

2) To help the existing youth health centers build on what is working well, create a plan to fill any identified gaps and help them comply with the NS Standards for Youth Health Centres (for more information on the standards visit [www.gov.ns.ca/hpp/](http://www.gov.ns.ca/hpp/)).

Research demonstrates that improved access to health care is linked to a reduction in risky behaviors, improved health status, and is an indicator of equity.

Youth who have access to youth-specific services are more likely to use primary care services. Youth living in poverty, females, LGBT-

TIQ and at-risk youth benefit particularly from youth-targeted services.

The model for youth health centers in Annapolis Valley will include a comprehensive range of supports and services based on the NS Standards for Youth Health Centers document. There will be a core group of services included

with input from youth that reflect the following components: Clinical Services; Health Counseling and Support; Referrals to other services;

Health Education; Health Promotion, and Community Capacity Building

Youth will be key participants and actively engaged in all aspects of this process, including the incorporation of fun recreational activities into the youth center model.

Accessibility will be a key principle considered when developing

the model. Ways of providing transportation for youth if the center is not located in a school is something that will be examined. If the youth health center is in a school, access for youth that are homeless, out-of-school youth, and permission for students to visit the center during the day are all issues that will be taken into account.

According to Carol MacKinnon, the Director of Public Health for the Annapolis Valley, "All aspects of diversity will be considered and incorporated into the model. Youth from various ethnic and cultural groups, the disabled, all sexual orientations, gender identities and various other diverse groups will have a voice, and their specific needs will be incorporated into the model ultimately giving them a place of belonging. Youth health centers in the valley will be open, confidential and safe environments for all youth."

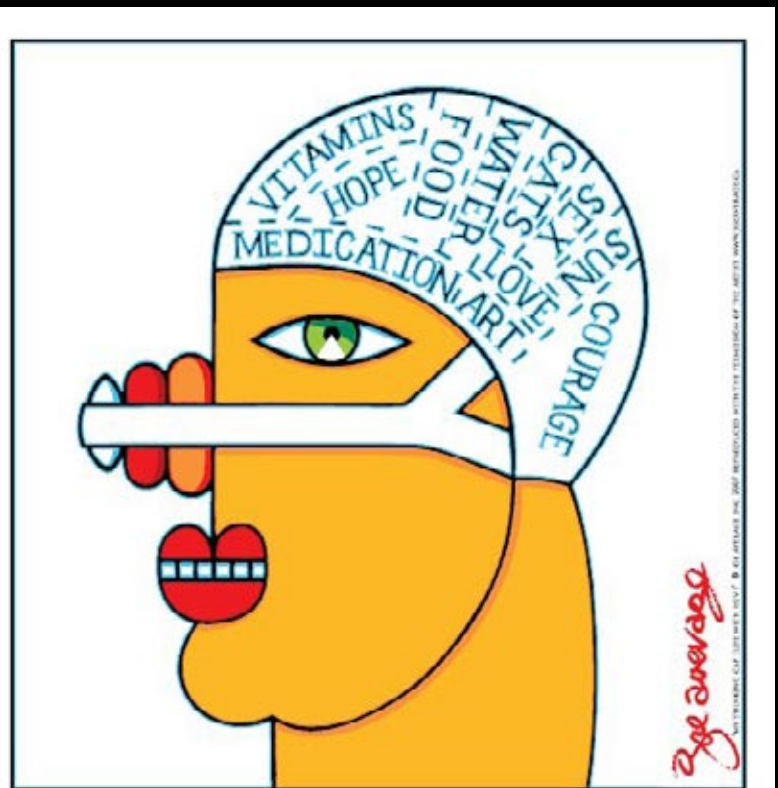
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# Come Out 2 the Grawood

nett-Cook, Mayor Mike Smith, Ramona Westgate from Pride of Pictou County, Andy Hewlett from the Halifax Pride Committee, Sue Andrews of BLT-Womyn of Halifax, Shawn Adams from the Centre of Hope in Halifax, Jim Harpell a former Provincial NDP candidate and local business owner, Denise Holliday representing the transgendered community, and Georgina Foster of Truro Pride.

CBC, CTV and Global News were all there, as was CBC Radio, both English and French, the Chronicle Herald, and Truro Daily News. The Globe and Mail did not make it to the rally but contacted us shortly after. There was a Pride flag that everyone

signed that we are going to deliver to the Mayor and Town Council, along with a petition asking Town Council to reconsider.

The next morning a small group of supporters gathered in the rain in front of the offices of the Municipality of the County of Colchester with Mayor Mike Smith to raise

the Pride flag. It was great to see the flag flying over Truro after all of this, and only a few blocks from where it started at the town of Truro offices.

In a way Mayor Bill Mills did the gay community a great service

by refusing our request to fly the Pride Flag; if Council agreed we would have been lucky to get a writeup in the Truro Daily News, whereas we continue to receive requests from media outlets. A story in the Truro Daily News states that the town is getting e-mails and phone calls from people planning on vacationing or at least stopping off in Truro who are now refusing to do so because of the refusal to fly the flag and the Mayor's comments. We are also looking at filing a Human Rights complaint with the Nova Scotia Human Rights Commission about this incident; similar cases have been won against towns in Ontario and British Columbia.

Truro Pride is moving forward with plans for a dance on September 22, 2007 at the Truro Lions' Club. A new youth group is being formed and there is talk about start-

ing a local PFLAG group so, even if the decision is not reversed, we now have the support and determination to make Truro a welcoming place for all members of the GLBT community.

It's probably safe to say that once you've been a Co-Chair of the Halifax Pride Committee, you either walk away in stunned relief, or you keep coming back for more punishment. I'm afraid I fall into the second category. I'm hooked by the extraordinary uplift I get when I see our fabulous community parading its Rainbow wonderfulness through the heart of this most beautiful and historic (and historically Queer) old seaport. I love Pride! I love the lectures and

the films; the high art and the low, low camp; the whole sequined mix of the sordid and sublime that is Pride in Halifax. Yet, as one of those hard-bitten former Co-Chairs, I know it takes a lot of work to put it all in place, and I'm not just talking about unloading trucks and heaving metal barriers around in a steady downpour for three hours on the Halifax Commons! It goes on for months and it's a huge challenge.

I think Pride needs to revisit its way of doing business. I think it

needs to think about becoming a year-round organization, with the same kind of staff and financial supports as the Jazz Festival and the Atlantic Film Festival. If this could happen, I believe it might be of benefit to Prides around the region, as we could share ideas and contacts. There's no doubt in my mind that Halifax can become a major destination for LGBT tourists from around the world, and that Pride will play a huge role in that. It's already making a difference. Yet for Pride to really achieve

its potential, we need to solidify our organization so it's not having to reinvent itself from year to year. I've been talking with friends and colleagues, and I've put some ideas down on paper about some ways the Committee might be set up differently. # Newfoundland GUYZ Project

The Gay Urban Youth Zone (GUYZ) Project is a project of the AIDS Committee of Newfoundland and Labrador. It is a 26-month endeavour funded by the Public Health Agency of Canada. The Project is an excellent way for young gay men in St. John's to find a sense of community, connect with local resources, and learn how to tackle issues that affect their health and well-being. The GUYZ Project is designed to educate young gay men about HIV, STIs and Hep C, as well as inform service providers of some of the issues that gay youth face—issues such as heterosexism, judgmental attitudes, and lack of support.

Over the past 17 months, the Project has been involved in a number of initiatives: on-going bar and event outreach, education and resource development, and the completion of an online educational tool to reach young gay men. The website touches on issues of sexuality, self-esteem, sexual orientation, prevention, hepatitis, HIV, and STIs, as well as testing information. 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# Fire Impacts Queer Businesses

In the early evening hours of July 27, fire broke out inside the apartment located in the annex portion of the building housing Mollyz Diner and Menz Bar. Within a short time the flames had consumed the contents of the apartment. Local firefighters worked to contain the blaze and eventually extinguished it. However, the blaze left the annex gutted. Water and smoke caused significant damage to the businesses in the building.

Co-owner Doug Melanson indicated that both businesses were closed for over a week for repairs. "After the fire inspectors had done

their investigation, it was deemed that a cigarette or something of the sort caught the bedding on fire and it went through the apartment," he explained. "As a result we lost the entire length of the bar from two ceiling tiles out, when the water came in from the third floor. The water took out all the electronics and equipment stored in the cage and behind the bar."

"From there the water continued through and wiped out most of the alcohol and all the food in the diner," Doug continued. "Compared to the small kitchen fire we had earlier this year, this was ma-

lor. There was around \$200,000 in damage. By the middle of August, though, the second half of the dining room should be re-opened and we'll be back to normal."

When asked to address the rumours of possible expansion of the seminal Gottingen Street queer businesses, Doug explained his tentative plans. "We are definitely investigating that possibility," he said. "There's a lot of work to be done before this can happen. We need to sit down with the city to determine whether the affected section of the building can be converted from residential to commercial. We need to meet with

the liquor inspectors to ensure that we can extend our license. We have to meet with a structural engineer to determine that the building is sound so that we can create a dance floor on the second level of the Mollyz annex and eventually move the office to the third floor.

"There are also negotiations going on with our landlord with regard to taking over the entire building versus the sixty percent occupancy that we currently have. There's a lot of negotiations going on right now and lot of legwork to ensure that we can move things forward from a business point of view.

We won't know until sometime in September if this possibility exists, so right now this future growth is all in the planning stages."

*Dear Dawn, I'm not gay but I do enjoy fucking men sometimes. I've been happily married for 22 years. My wife knows and is fine with it as long as I don't bring anything home. But herein lies the problem: I can't get off if I have to wear a raincoat to do it. For me bare-backing is the only way, otherwise what's the point? Is it really that risky, I mean, is it easy to catch HIV this way?*

*Signed, Going without my raincoat.*

Dear Raincoatless, YES it is! You need to know your risks so you can make informed decisions. For example, according to Health Canada, men who have sex with

men (MSM) account for the largest number of reported HIV diagnoses in Canada. In fact, MSM account for 70% of positive HIV tests since 1985. Knowing this, you must admit bare-backing is taking a huge risk for you and your wife.

However, if you insist on "going without a raincoat" there are ways to reduce the risk. HIV is harder to pass from bottom to top than it is from top to bottom, so

it's somewhat safer to give than receive. Gentle anal sex with lots of lube is less risky than rough sex

without lube. Obviously, cumming outside is safer than inside an ass or mouth. Keeping your penis and your ass clean before and after will also help a little. If you are the top, taking a leak after sex can also lower your chance of getting some

STI's. STI's will increase your risk of HIV transmission.

These are only a few ideas to help you lower your risk. Knowledge is power—if you want to learn more, contact your local AIDS service organization, or check out [www.rainbowhealth.ca](http://www.rainbowhealth.ca) for more info. It's important to communicate with your sex partners. Ask them if they are positive, but don't rely solely on what they say—they may not be aware of their own HIV status. How often do you get tested?

Knowing that you are in the highest risk group, you really have to ask yourself what it's worth—is it worth putting my life, my wife's

life and my sex partners at risk because I can't get off without a raincoat? In my opinion, that's extremely selfish. Why not use a condom? You can get some very good, very thin condoms that allow for maximum sensitivity. Just imagine how much better fucking could be without all these concerns on your mind.

# Halifax Pride Day Synagogue

On the morning of July 21, 2007, Dan MacKay and I attended service at Shar Shalom synagogue in Halifax. Judaism is not my normal spiritual practice—this was in fact my first visit to a synagogue—but the cantor, Ari Isenberg, was to speak that morning on the topic of being gay and Jewish. He read first from a memoir written by a gay rabbi who had struggled with his feelings and desires for many years—especially at Yom Kippur, the day of atonement when passages from Leviticus would be read aloud. Cantor Isenberg went on to describe the traditional ways of dealing with homosexuality within the Jewish faith. Fasting and prayer, cold showers, getting married, even eating figs were all methods used in hopes of "curing" gay men and women. If all else failed you would be advised to dress in black and leave the area, taking your shame away from your friends and family—an attitude chillingly familiar to most of us.

However, Cantor Isenberg then went on to say that while principles should be held onto, the rules can and should change as social

circumstances change. He pointed out that this has already happened within the Jewish faith in areas like divorce, interest rates and slavery. And now it is time to change the rules about homosexuality. He stated firmly that he was in favour of gay rights and was honoured and happy to be taking part in the multid denominational service as part of Gay Pride Week. I was surprised to find myself quite emotional hearing his words. Perhaps those words of acceptance and welcome touched on old sealed-away feelings from a time when I felt I could not be gay and also loved by the Creator.

I was reminded of Sister Jeanine Gramick, who for over twenty years has ministered to and worked for the queer community in spite of being told repeatedly by the Vatican to stop. Sister Jeanine has written books, organized retreats, spoken publicly on LGBT rights and co-founded New Ways Ministry, a Catholic social justice center. When pressure was brought to bear on her order, the School Sisters of Notre Dame, and she was told she must refrain from

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# The Nature Of Queer V - Gay Evolution

Ever since the first proof of a link between homosexuality and genetics became evident, a heated discussion arose on how the proposed genetic factors are maintained in the human population. The nature

of homosexual sex clearly excludes the production of offspring and thus the transmission of genetic material, amongst it the putative "gay genes."

Explanations for this "Darwinian paradox" do not come easy.

Evolution of human behavior can hardly be demonstrated experimentally, so theories are the closest scientists can come up with.

Evolutionary psychologists try to explain the persistence of homo-

sexuality by the gross restructuring of social networks that occurred within the last 10,000 years. As the "hunter-gatherer period" ended and the "agricultural era" began, man was faced with a plethora of new tasks, which required development of more fine-tuned organizing skills in the fields of communication and social leadership, which are commonly viewed as feminine attributes.

The more feminine attributes a man exhibited, the more his attractiveness towards women increased. Women saw these men as better po-

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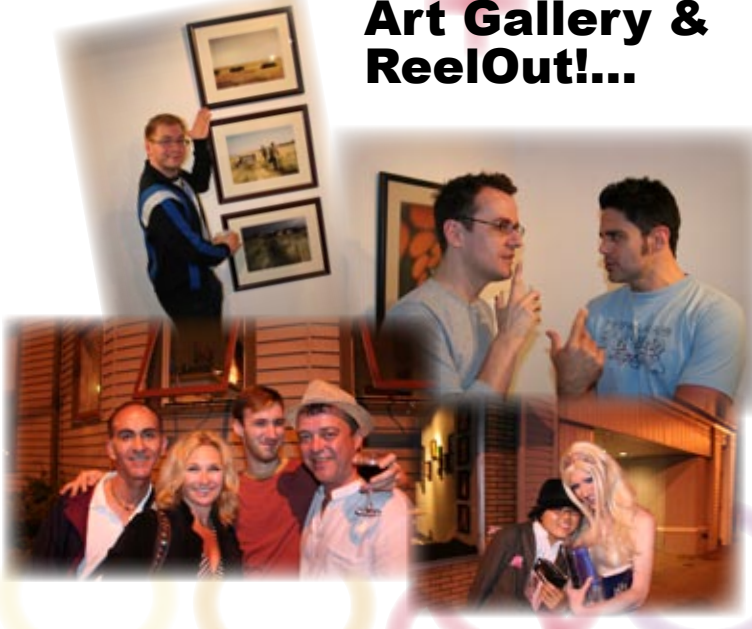

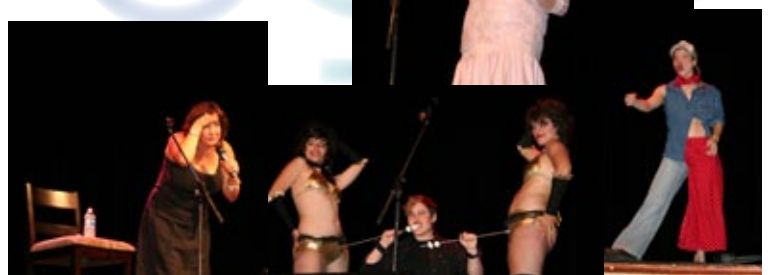

Since mid August or so, we have been in the peak of tomato season. The absolute best, in my opinion, are the heirloom varieties. They come in all different shapes, colours and sizes and have a particularly excellent balance of acidity to sweetness. This salad makes a great side to any seasonal meal, and particularly any grilled items, be they meat, fish, or vegetables. I based it on the Italian classic "Carpese" which is tomato, basil and fresh mozzarella cheese, day old bread, aged balsamic vinegar and good olive oil. This is my interpretation on an old classic brought to new life. "Viva l'Italia!"

tential fathers since they were more empathetic, sensitive and kind, and less of a danger in terms of aggression. The "new" man therefore had a selective advantage over the "old" man. Homosexuality then developed in male offspring had they received a copiousness of those female attributes.

A slightly different perspective on how homosexuality may have been manifested is through same-sex alliances. Men were able to gain power and respect through homosocial behavior, thereby ensuring their survival. The genetic traits of this behavior were thus preferentially transmitted to offspring, and then further evolved into homosexuality? May I ask at this point: Whatever happened to same-sex alliances?

The only fact-based theory picks up a point that I mentioned in one of my earlier columns: the unusually high number of homosexuals in the maternal line of families. A research study suggests that females in maternal lines of homosexuals show a higher fecundity than do females in maternal lines of heterosexuals, thus transmitting "larger quantities" of genetic material, and thus possibly "gay genes."

In all of the readings on the evolutionary persistence of homosexuality, I was struck that one fact was never addressed: the actual transmission of genes by homosexuals due to sexual reproduction. It seems to me as though scientists think that homosexuality excludes the production of offspring. Okay, this is true for the nature of homosexual sexual activity: man-on-man

and woman-on-woman does not equal a baby, but: gays produce sperm and lesbians have eggs, so we are definitely able to reproduce. Many lesbians choose to give birth, and surely there are gays that would like to have children of their own (me, for instance). Besides, there are numerous gay men that come out of the closet after having produced offspring, i.e. after passing on their genes. So the transmission of gay genes by homosexuals themselves surely contributes to homosexual persistence as well. Now that's research to look into!

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## Heirloom Tomato Salad "Carpese Style"

### Ingredients (side salad for 4)

- 4 large beefsteak tomatoes (tops sliced off and reserved, core hollowed out)
- 2 lb. assorted mini heirloom tomatoes (washed and quartered)
- 2 slices day old Italian loaf (rub with olive oil and grill on both sides, then small dice)
- 1/4 cup crumbled gorgonzola blue cheese
- 1/2 cup torn fresh basil leaves
- 1 tbsp minced red onion
- 4 tbsp prepared basil pesto

### Vinaigrette

- 1/2 cup whole garlic cloves
- 1 cup extra virgin olive oil
- 1/2 of a roasted red pepper (jarred are O.K., cut in small dice)
- 1/4 cup white balsamic vinegar
- 1/4 cup minced fresh chives
- 1 tsp fleur de sel and
- 1/2 tsp fresh cracked pink pepper (or to taste)

### Method

1. Place the garlic and oil in a sauce pan and bring to 180F on a deep fry thermometer, reduce heat to 160F and poach the garlic until fork tender. (note: this should take about 10 minutes; garlic should have no colour.) 2. When garlic is ready, remove it from the oil, give it a rough chop and set aside. Whisk the vinegar into the oil, add remaining vinaigrette ingredients, stir, and place in an airtight container. Refrigerate overnight for best flavour. 3. When ready to make salad, place all ingredients except for the beefsteak tomatoes in a mixing bowl. Toss the ingredients with enough vinaigrette to coat everything, season the inside of the beefsteak tomatoes, and fill with the mixed salad. 4. Place 1 tbsp of pesto in the center of 4 serving bowls, place a stuffed tomato on top of the pesto in each bowl, drizzle with a little more vinaigrette, cover with their respective tomato tops and serve.

Note: This salad is always better when the tomatoes are at room temperature.

speaking publicly on homosexuality, she changed her order and joined the Sisters of Loretto, who support her work and advocacy on behalf of the queer community. When asked how she can be a good Catholic and yet defy the orders of her church, she replied that she makes a clear distinction between the church—which for her means all the people of the Catholic faith—and the church hierarchy. As Cantor Isenberg might say, she follows the principles of her faith, not the rules of its leaders.

I remembered, too, the United Church minister who officiated at the wedding of two women friends of mine and who added so much to the joyful celebration of love and connection—clearly someone who followed the embracing spirit of his religion rather than the thou shalt nots.

How sad it is that there are still queer men and women who feel that they must make a choice between their faith and their natural sexual feelings. This is a political rather than spiritual issue, a fight for power, not a struggle over faith. Those religious groups who remain the most adamantly opposed to acceptance of homosexuals as part of the natural diversity of human beings, are also politically the right wing conservatives—like those Americans who believe any criticism of George W. Bush is a direct attack on the United States.

They make religious virtues out of denial and repression, just as they confuse the letter of the law with its spirit. They judge their fellow humans according to old rigid rules, rather than finding joy in the founding principles of all faiths: compassion, acceptance and love.

## Religious Zealots like Mayor Bill Mills

"Read Romans, chapter one." The infamous statement of Truro mayor Bill Mills rings in my head. I have to admit I no longer own a bible. If I did I would probably look it up out of curiosity, but that's neither the point nor important to me at all. I was raised reading the bible and can quote it word for word in defense of just about anything from why not to litter to improvements of the social-welfare system. But I don't, in defense of any of my opinions—I use logic and reason (critical thinking skills learned in university).

And in my own long quest to become secure in my own sexual-

ity, I searched beyond logic and I searched my soul. There was a time when I looked to the bible for guidance as to whether or not being gay was wrong or right. And when I tell people that I went through a sexuality-reprogramming program as a teenager—they're usually horrified. Some are amazed that such programs exist.

Yes, there were and still are ministries for homosexuals who want to "choose" to leave the gay "lifestyle." The Evangelicals have groups called Desert Stream and Living Waters, the Mormons have a group called Evergreen, the Catholics even have a group for Priests who can support each

other in resisting temptation, and then there is the non-denominational HA-FS or Homosexuals Anonymous which has a chapter in Yarmouth.

There are even psychiatrists who used aversion therapy for the purpose of sexuality reprogramming in the 70's that are still on staff at Canadian universities. While it is now a discredited treatment for people—it included electroshock, or nausea-inducing drugs used during pornographic slide shows—animal behaviourists tried using the shock type aversion therapy to reprogram three "gay" penguins in a German zoo as recently as 2005 (call the SPCA!).

Thank God, I was never subjected to that type of therapy. And while I resisted the reprogramming, like the penguins, I certainly got a good mind fucking that has taken years to heal. I have come to the point where I don't mind talking about it and I really appreciated one lesbian friend who said, "thank goodness you're still with us." I can even laugh about the absurdity of it. For example, the two co-leaders of the group I was in slept with each other, and then confessed and repented the dirty deed later. I too must confess that I slept with a few young men in the group. Being an especially tough case, I never really felt bad about myself for having

done it. I chuckle to myself when I think of it as the strangest group of self-loathing fuck-buddies I've ever known.

While I don't read the bible (Sorry Bill) or affiliate with any particular religious faith, my experience has allowed me to evolve into a confident spiritual gay man. I have been able, despite the efforts of religious zealots like Bill, to reconcile my faith in God and my faith in myself. I have, however, lost faith in people who use the bible to prop up poorly defended statements or to justify hate or mistreatment of any of God's children.

## Open Letter To Truro Mayor Bill Mills

An open letter to His Worship, Mayor W. R. Mills and Members of Truro Town Council:

Like fog in winter, homophobia and transphobia often appear, seemingly without warning and in some of the most treacherous combinations. Truro has experienced such a thing recently. Possibly the thickest wall of homophobic fog to come off the Fundy in many years has covered Truro as the mayor of Truro failed in his official capacity to separate Church and State. The wording of his recent flag banning announcement created a chill that will be felt across Canada in every community.

Pride is about acceptance and the right to live your life. Ten percent of Canadians are GLBTI, and like everyone else have the right to be who they are, to be proud of who they are, and to live life with dignity and without public ridicule

or attack. Twenty-five percent of Truro's families are GLBTI. Many have experienced the loss of loved ones who killed themselves or moved far away because of the promotion of homophobia and transphobia.

The flying of the Rainbow flag is a reminder of those who died without hope, and a call to us and to the public in general to recognize that we all have a right to personal respect and safety. The mayor's actions have called into question Truro's reputation as a compassionate and accepting community. His action will continue to create disharmony and social unrest, as some will take his remarks as a call to arms and preach more hatred, and GLBTI will be labelled sinners and social outcasts. Schools and educational facilities have striven hard to educate the public about diversity, but these lessons are in

danger of being quickly forgotten. Trans people and their families who felt safe last week are now the center of attention; gay and lesbian families are once more pointed out and pointed at for what they are instead of who they are.

The Rainbow flag is not about promoting a so-called gay lifestyle, it is about understanding sexual and gender diversity and celebrating acceptance. In Canada there must be no way for one group/person's beliefs to be used to create a society in which 25% of Canadians have to feel that they or their family members are less than acceptable as citizens.

Homophobia and transphobia as forms of hatred equal racism or anti-Semitism. Public awareness and education can reduce it. Maritime Transgender Workplace Solutions Project works to eliminate barriers as well as educate politicians and community leaders on these issues. The mayor and the council need to realize that the right of free speech does not allow anyone to use an official office to spread hatred and propaganda against 25% of a population they are sworn to serve. The council's actions have been short-sighted and

long-reaching. Hopefully, Truro's citizens will show the Maritimes that they are bigger than the Council and stand for what is right and

reasonable as a free and accepting society for all Truro citizens.

### Last Month's question:

In the last Wayves issue we asked you readers "Is there a need for a LGBT Community Centre in your area?" The responses were overall positive: 14 readers voted Yes, three were not sure and four said No.

The general consensus was that a community centre is needed as a drop-in centre "where...people can go and feel comfortable," as "a safe and welcoming place for all." Special acknowledgement went to youth who are struggling to come to terms with their sexual orientation; a community centre could facilitate their search for identity and coming-out process, with those who have already gone through this process providing mentorship.

Other readers thought more in a networking way, where a community centre could be used as a meeting space for groups within the community, to educate about LGBT issues and HIV/AIDS, and to provide legal services. The most passionate response sees the community centre as a chance to bring the various groups of our community closer together, and that the whole idea of a community centre is "long overdue."

The only comment that came with a No response displays worries that a community centre might end up being run by the wrong people, "who...will always make it what THEY want rather than what other people want in the community."
