Halifax Pride: Volunteer All Call!

Every year the Halifax Pride Week festival needs volunteers. This year is no different. As the community festival continues to grow, the backbone to its success depends on attracting and keeping good volunteers.

Here's an overview of this year's requirements:

A minimum of five people are needed to sell t-shirts and other merchandise at various venues throughout the week.

The Pride parade will need people at the marshalling yard prior to the parade to assist with the decorating of the floats as well as carrying the two Pride flags (Halifax's requires 16 people and Ottawa's requires 40 people). Twenty parade marshals are needed to walk the route during the parade to ensure a safe distance between the entrants themselves, and that the spectators are a safe distance from the entrants. The walking marshals also contribute greatly to clearing any bottle-necked areas along the parade route to ensure a

smooth flow and timely arrival at the Garrison Grounds.

Roughly six volunteers are required for the Community Fair on Saturday, July 24 from 9:00 a.m. – 6:00 p.m. They will assist the Community Fair Coordinator with the set-up, management and placement of all vendors. The Main Stage Coordinator will also need about six volunteers to assist with the transportation of all talent and ensuring the performers are ready to go on stage at least five minutes prior to their time slot.

Volunteer coordinator Kathy Walsh says that the grounds setup team "...is the most important and glamorous of all, because people wouldn't have a great time at the festival without them!" This team marks off the marshalling yard into slots designated for parade entrants and are also in charge of the set-up and tear-down of the tables and chairs for the Garrison Grounds beer tent. At the end, they are also responsible for the clean up of the Grounds.

The Queer Acts Theatre festival

is also looking for volunteers to assisting with the sale of tickets and merchandise.

Besides feeling good about being part of a great celebration there are additional benefits to volunteering your time... for a minimum of two hours of volunteer work you'll get a snazzy Pride t-shirt, you'll have fun with your friends (who happen to volunteer along with you) and make new friends along the way.

Halifax Pride will host a volunteer training session at Empire Park Lane on Spring Garden Road on July 10, tentatively scheduled to run from 11:00 a.m. – 1:00 p.m. For more information and to get your questions answered contact Kathy at Halifax.Pride.Volunteers@gmail.com.

Camp Eclipse: OUT in the Woods

ST JOHN'S — Camp Eclipse: "OUT in the Woods" had a great time in '09 and we're doing it again in 2010! Last year an amazing mix of people, including queer, straight, and questioning youth and adults took part. This youth leadership retreat, hosted by Planned Parenthood: NL Sexual Health Centre, took place at the tranquil Environmental Education Centre, which provided the perfect setting for reflection, healing, and growth. The Centre is located in a tranquil, wilderness setting on the Avalon Peninsula only an hour and a quarter from St. John's, Newfoundland.

Twenty-one young campers and nine community leaders took part in three days of empowering workshops and discussions on such topics as homophobia and heterosexism, how to establish gay-straight alli-

ances in schools, queer history of Newfoundland, transgenderism, and self-awareness reflection activities. There were also plenty of camp fires, nature walks, arts and crafts, and even a traditional Mi'kmaw cleansing ceremony.

At the end of the Camp, the youth were given the opportunity to leave comments. This is what some had to say: "Acceptance is overwhelming. Simply put." "There is support out there, you just have to reach for it." "I am going to be okay no matter what because I have a community, an amazing strong community that I know will always be there for me." "I can be happier in life; the leaders were amazing and really helped me turn my life around." "I learned that I am valued. I am equal."

During Camp, youth were encouraged to write a letter to themselves,

which was only recently mailed back to them. This letter allowed youth to reflect on how their thoughts and

lives have changed since the Camp. Upon receiving their letters, many youth stated how reading the letters reminded them of the strength they gained and how they found the courage to face many challenges: "I got my letter recently, and boy did I cry. But it also made me look back at the me who was writing the letter, compared to the me now. And like I told myself, camp has definitely made me stronger and more accepting of myself, and has helped me overcome many a wall since then..."

This year, Planned Parenthood will host a four-day leadership retreat

from August 21 to 24. New workshops and activities will be offered, with more time to relax and enjoy the safe space. This year, thirty youth will be given the opportunity to learn how to enable and implement changes in their schools and communities, to build strong social support networks, and to have fun in a supportive, non-judgemental environment.

"At last, Prince Edward Island's LGBT community will have easy access to reading materials specifically related to them," says Abegweit Rainbow Collective Female Co-chair, Alana Leard of the recently-opened Pat Malone Memorial Library. "The materials available in the library range from fiction to non-fiction to magazines and educational information."

The library was officially dedicated on May 17. Located in the AIDS PEI

office (Unit 2, 375 University Avenue, Charlottetown), and spearheaded by PFLAG Canada—PEI, the library intends to honour the contributions of the late Pat Malone in fostering diversity and LGBT education in the province.

"We wanted a way to pay tribute to Pat's amazing energy and passion for fighting homophobia in Prince Edward Island," says PFLAG

Canada—PEI co-chair Bill Kendrick. "By partnering with the Abegweit Rainbow Collective and AIDS PEI we have created a lasting memorial to Pat's belief in promoting diversity."

Most of the books in the library have been provided through the generous support of Peter Bernier; Peter lives in Toronto and has made it his mission to ensure smaller communities across Canada have access to LGBT literature.

Culbert Leads PEI Pride Parade

Jim Culbert will be the Pride Parade Marshall for Prince Edward Island's Pride 2010.

A bit of history. In May, 1988 Jim moved from Ontario to Prince Edward Island. The only visible gay thing in the province seemed to be the lesbian toll-free number in the Guardian newspaper. Since then Jim has worked tirelessly to bring gay issues to the forefront.

A month after his move, Jim opened Blair Hall, the Island's first gay-owned and operated, out-of-the-closet bed and breakfast. Two years later, in October, 1990 Jim started the annual GLBT Thanksgiving pot luck supper, which continues to this day.

In 1996 Jim invited gay-owned and operated B&B's from Nova Scotia and New Brunswick to a Thanksgiving weekend get-together. From this, Atlantic Rainbow Connections was formed, an informal way to let travellers heading to the Maritimes know that such gay B&B's existed.

In 1997 Jim was Canada's top fundraiser for that year's AIDS Walk. Next year, Jim raised approximately \$15,000.00, money which stayed in the province for use by AIDS P.E.I.

In 1998 Jim sold Blair Hall and renovated the now-closed general store to open Rainbow Lodge (www.gaypei.com), a colourful fixture on Vernon Bridge's rustic rural landscape.

In April, 2004, with gay business owners from all three Maritime province, Jim founded the Atlantic Rainbow Business Association (www.arba.ca), a non-profit gay business organization. During that year's Federal election, Jim hosted television reporters at Rainbow Lodge and expressed on-camera his views on the "new" Conservative government's policies with regards to gay issues.

In July, 2005 Jim added a second career to his accomplishments, becoming an ordained minister in the Universal Life Church. A year later Jim invited representatives from local churches to help with the annual Pride church service. Clergy from the Anglican, United and Presbyterian churches attended; the Catholic Church declined. We believe that that was a first in Canada. A month after that, in August, 2005 Jim hosted the province's first same-sex marriage at Rainbow Lodge.

In June, 2006 Jim was appointed the first Marriage Commissioner of Prince Edward Island. That same day he performed the first same-sex marriage after the same-sex marriage bill was passed by the provincial legislature.

Jim has had many interviews with magazines, a 15-minute segment on Toronto's Careers TV... all for the betterment of travelling gays and lesbians. Jim continues to be an outspoken advocate of promoting not only gay rights but also equal rights for all.

Hi Tommo,

I think I already mentioned to you that I am doing an informal study of online dating. I have profiles on several sites, from the strictly-looking-for-sex-now kinds—where face pics are a rarity—to the more “grown up” dating sites where certain words, even in private messages are censored, so messages read “I’d love to **** your ****,” and people talk about their dogs as their affectionate life companions rather than as role models for sexual positions.

Anyway, my study has led to some very interesting exchanges of ideas and the odd—some of them decidedly odd—encounter. I’ve discovered there are some lovely people out there in the world, which is gratifying, but I’ve also met up with quite a number of repressed, closeted, unhappy types too. I’ve had messages from men whose profiles clearly state that they are a man looking for a woman, and when I ask whether there has been some misunderstanding, the reply is generally along the lines of “well, I have to explore my bi side too,” or “I’m hoping to meet a man who can bring me into my gayness.” I’m no missionary nor am I a tour guide for the world of gay but, more often than not, I can’t help wanting to listen and give some attention to their emotional plight. One man chatted with me for over an hour on messenger and the next day sent a message saying thanks and that after our conversation he decided to come out to his friends and family and he had never felt so free.

Most of the bi guys, however, are not looking for any change to their lifestyle at all, including one man who showed up at my door—alright yes I did give him my address—and who clearly thought that a handshake was sufficient foreplay. I wish I could say that I’m the sort of morally upright man who would say, I’m not that kind of man, I need to have some human connection, some conversation about life and culture and whether you are a Liza or a Barbra fan, so stop undoing your pants! I’d like to say that, Tom, but somehow the proverb about the bird in the hand came to mind. I used the other hand to close the apartment door.

The other happy discovery is the number of younger men (20’s and 30’s) who have an appreciation for a man of my mature years. Sometimes this appreciation is just “lip service” but often there is a nice physical, sexual, humorous albeit temporary union. Mostly this comes under the heading of NSA (no strings attached) but within those parameters there can be a real, human connection.

Not all my meetings have been so fortunate but why bore you with the story of the man who was so different from his profile picture I thought the garden gnome from Travelocity had shown up at my door. Or the guys who just want to add to their collection of dick pictures. Usually they don’t even have a pic of any kind but feel quite entitled to ask for a pic of my... well, you get the picture (they do not!). Or, the guys who only want to show you their dick photos. As you and I both know, Tom, not all penises are uniformly beautiful. And just as you can’t judge a book by its cover, nor can you anticipate the quality of a man’s willy by the size of his belt buckle. The age-old debate about “show-ers” versus “grow-ers.” I have had first hand experience of both kinds and I have to say, I love ’em both!

The other night I had a weird time travel kind of experience where I felt like I was back in high school. Well, it would have had to have been a very gay high school party to discover that I was the only guest and the party was to be a threesome. I have not the least objection to a ménage à trois—I’m no prude as I think we’ve established—but when both of the other participants are roaring drunk, the appeal is much diminished. Then I got thrown into the role of therapist/talk show host/referee. Most of the disjointed conversation between the two of them consisted of recriminations about some never-named but hurtful incident from weeks before.

“I can’t believe that you would do that to me after everything we’ve been through. I was surprised and really hurt you know. Oh my God, we should go get burgers. No, wait, we’re drunk and we have no money. Anyway, I forgive you.”

“I don’t know what you’re talking about. What did I do?”

“You know perfectly well, what I mean.”

“How many times do I have to tell you: Nothing happened! Is there any salad left in the fridge?”

Is it wrong of me, Tom, that I found this display of intermittent pain and anger entertaining? Both men, separately, gave me their phone numbers by the way, which I haven’t yet thrown away.

Trans Rights Bill goes to Parliament

OTTAWA— An historic Private Member’s Bill to extend full human rights protection to transsexual and transgender Canadians was debated for the first time today in the House of Commons.

Introduced by New Democrat Gay, Lesbian, Bisexual, Transgender and Transsexual Issues Critic Bill Siksay, the bill would add gender identity and gender expression as prohibited grounds of discrimination in the Canadian Human Rights Act. The bill also amends the hate crimes and sentencing provisions of the Criminal Code to protect trans people.

“This is a long overdue debate. Trans Canadians face well-documented and almost daily discrimination in the workplace, in housing, in health care and in the provision of services other Canadians take for granted. And violence against trans people is a significant issue,” noted Siksay. “This

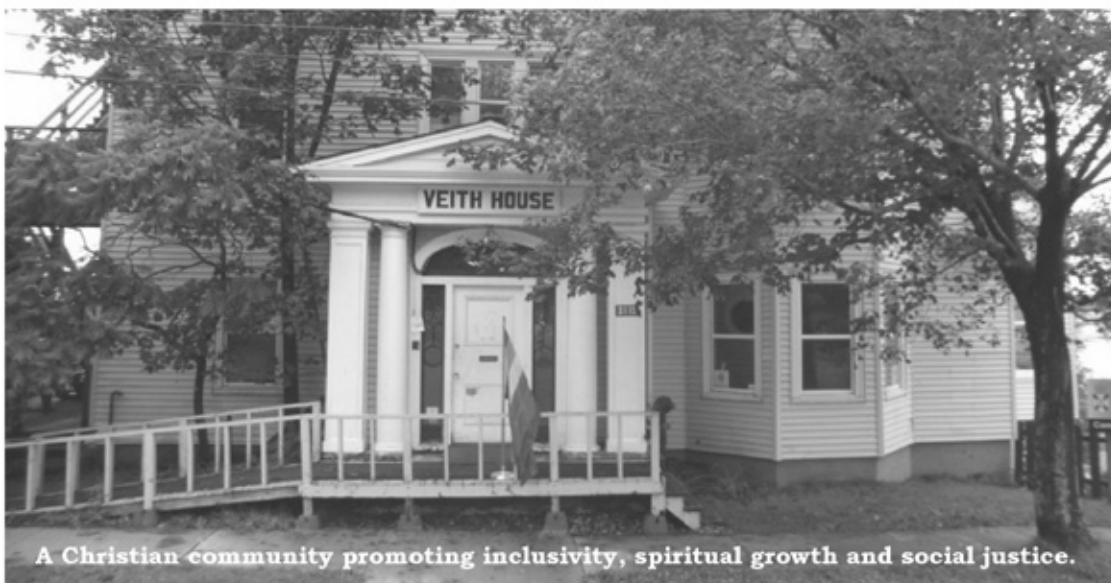
bill will make the full human rights of trans Canadians explicit in law.”

“Trans people are members of our families, our co-workers, and our neighbours; their ability to lead happy, health, secure and productive lives is crucial to our success as a society,” said Siksay.

“In 2000 the La Forest Report unanimously recommended explicit protection for trans people in the Canadian Human Rights Act. Yet 10 years later the Federal Government has failed to adopt legislation to include ‘gender identity and gender expression,’” said Susan Gapka, Chair of the Trans Health Lobby Group. “As trans people we are seeking the same enumerated protections that other disadvantaged groups already have achieved. Now is the Time to Deliver on Trans Human Rights!”

Siksay’s Bill was seconded by 12 other Member of Parliament.

Ryan MacGrath's CD Launches July 31

This July 31, Ryan MacGrath will launch his album, "Cooper Hatch Paris," at the Carlton, 1685 Argyle Street, Halifax at 9:00 p.m. The ten-track disc contains material penned by Ryan.

Over the last while Ryan and his band have been performing a lot of house concerts which lends itself nicely to the intimacy of many of his songs and music. For anyone who's watched him perform, Ryan's vocal range is reminiscent of the classic crooners. I'm reminded of Roy Orbison, for instance, but it's evident he's been inspired by many musicians and several genres. Ryan emotes a unique voice and refreshing musical style.

As for subject matter—his music is a delight in contrasts—exploring light and dark, love and loneliness, fantasy and reality. Ryan doesn't shy away from using engaging and self-effacing playful humour both in performance and subject.

When I asked Ryan about the title of the album, he explained that while living in Dartmouth with a friend he was "randomly inspired" by the mailbox labels of the tenants in his building. Simple as that.

While in Dartmouth he also used that time spend much time walking and drawing inspiration for many of the songs on the disc. Ryan doesn't have a favourite song on the album—he likes them all, and for many different reasons—but I did manage to tease a title out of him that has special resonance, "God Forbid," which he says is a song about self-realization, grappling with reality and family life.

Ryan's been very enthusiastic about collaborating with Atlantic Canadian musical talent with the likes of Laura Smith, Erin Costello and Gypsophilia. His manager and right-hand woman on this project has been Argyle Fine Arts owner/manager Adriana Afford. And he's utilized local design talent in the guise of graphics designer Nick Brunt, photographer Brent McCombs and wardrobe designer Louanna Murphy.

Ryan is currently on an Eastern Canada tour covering Quebec, Ontario and Atlantic Canadian venues which is bound to encourage a widening fan base. Ryan indicated he recently had the good fortune of selling one of his paintings to Chantal Kreviazuk: his manager happened to give her a demo of his work, and Kreviazuk loved his sound, saying the next time she was in Halifax she would promise to do an impromptu performance together. Something to look forward to!

Now if you happen to find yourself in a canoe, in the middle of a lake on some warm night this summer staring into a beautiful star-lit sky be sure to have Ryan's album on your iPod or MP3 player for some home-grown inspiration.

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Chef's Corner



Chef Darren is Chef/Co-owner of Chives Canadian Bistro, Halifax

In honour of the upcoming visit by Her Majesty The Queen, I offer "Queen Elizabeth Cake" Its origin is myriad, but the most recent and my favourite is that of Elizabeth, the late Queen Mother. As the story goes, this recipe was named by Wallis Simpson, American divorcée and mistress to the current Queen's late uncle, the ill-fated King Edward VIII. Once scandal broke that the head of the Church in England planned to marry a twice-divorced woman—and an American at that—the King was forced to abdicate. His brother, then Duke of York and his wife, Elizabeth, became King and Queen, while Edward and his tart were exiled to continental Europe. Wallis held a deep disdain for the now Queen sitting on what she saw as her throne. While living in France Wallis and Eddie hired an old British woman as their cook. One day she made the Windsors a cake for tea and the Duke loved its simplicity, stating how it reminded him of rural England. The Duchess piped up "I name thee, Queen Elizabeth Cake, rural and simple as she!"

Cake Fit for a Queen!

Ingredients

Cake:	1 cup white sugar	1 tsp baking powder	Topping
1 cup boiling water	1 egg 1 tsp vanilla extract	1/2 tsp salt	1 cup flaked sweet coconut
1 cup pitted dates (chopped)	1 1/2 cups flour	1/2 cup walnuts (chopped)	2/3 cup brown sugar
1/4 cup butter (soft)	1 tsp baking soda		6 Tbsp butter
			1/4 cup heavy cream

Method

1. Pour boiling water over dates and let stand until cool, then purée. 2. Mix the dry ingredients together, set aside. 3. Cream the butter and sugar in a stand mixer until smooth, add the egg and vanilla 4. Add 1 part dry mix, then 1 part dates, 1 part dry, in three stages. 5. Pour batter into a 10" greased cake pan and bake at 350°F for 30-40 min until tooth pick comes out of centre clean. 6. Cool on wire rack until room temperature then turn out onto serving plate. 7. Mix coconut, brown sugar, butter and cream in a sauce pan and cook over med heat until thick and creamy, then crown the cake with the mixture, let stand until room temperature.

Serving suggestion

This cake is great served with traditional English custard sauce, or Devon cream and a nice cup of tea.

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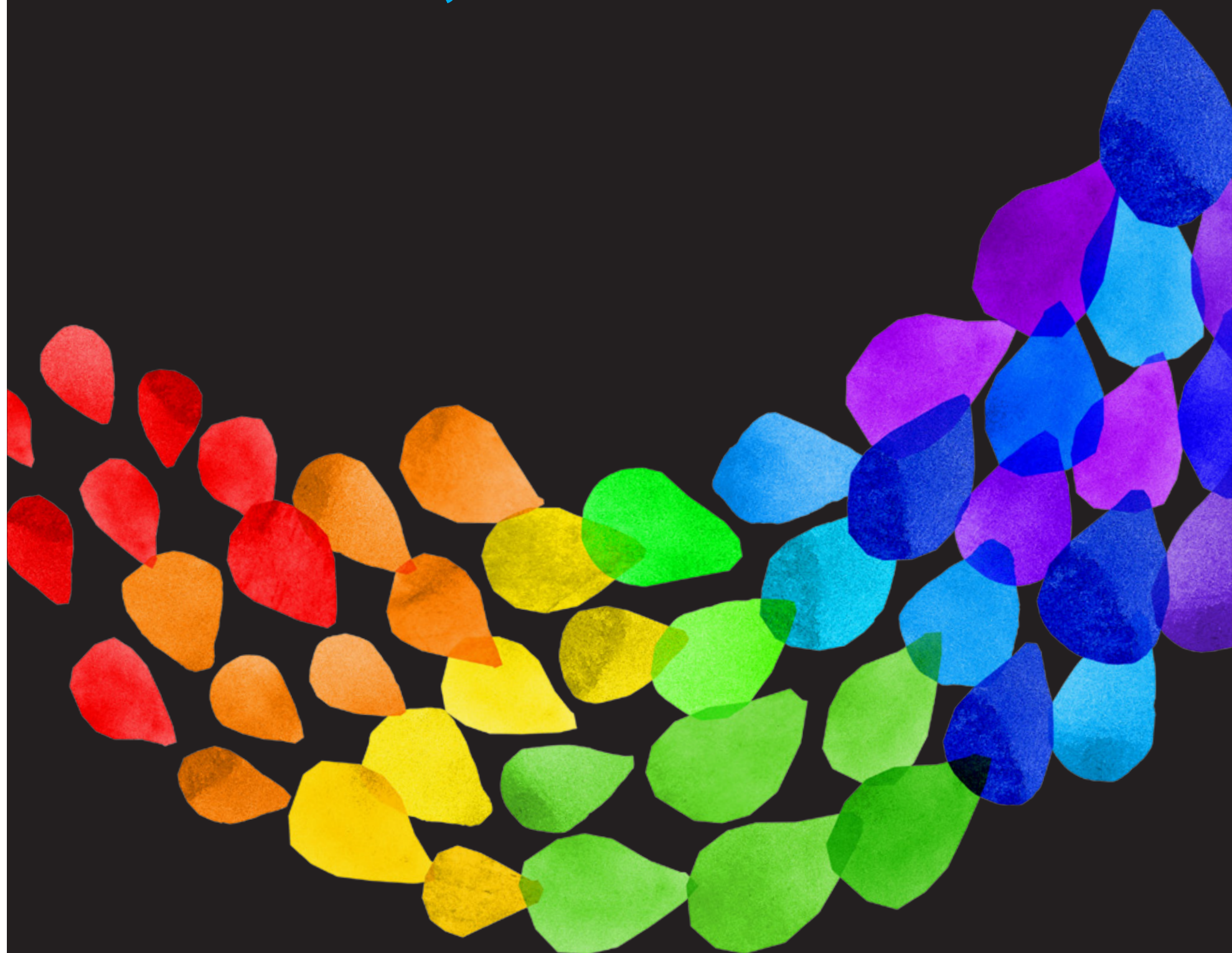

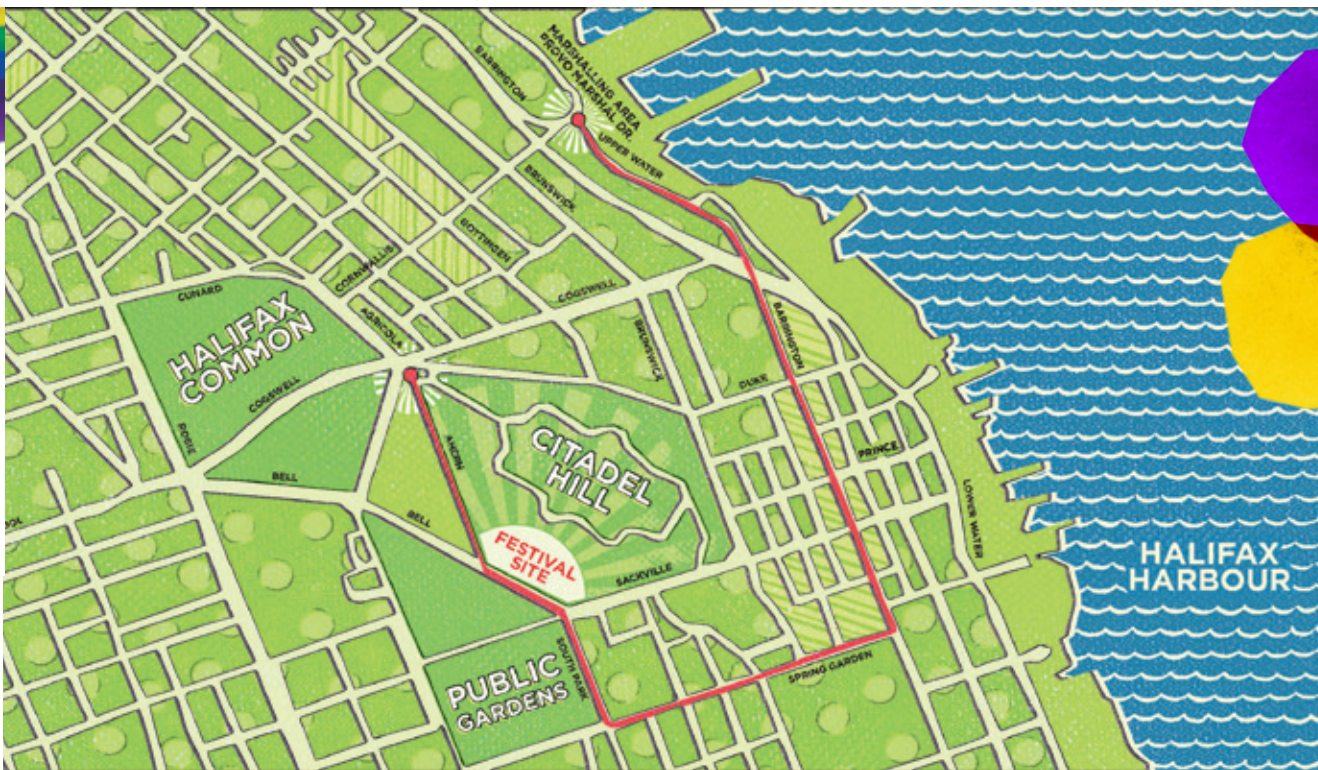

Logan and I is the story of two boys from very different worlds, bound to each other by shame. Logan is enamoured with Dezy's toy collection; Dezy, in turn, is thrilled to have a protector from the schoolyard bullies. But when a copy of *The Joy of Sex* sparks a period of sexual discovery between them, Dezy finds out that being best friends with Logan comes with its own dangers. Passionate, funny, and heart wrenching, Logan and I is a dark look at the beast and beauty within.

Following Logan and I is **nggrfg**. NGGRFG. Imagine it with vowels. Can you even imagine the words? Can you say them? Imagine hearing them. Nigger. Fag. Drawing from a past filled with these words, writer-performer Berend McKenzie has crafted a revealing and often hilarious one-man tour-de-force about a queer black kid negotiating the bewildering minefield of straight white Canada: from the schoolyard, to the perils of dating, to the "glamour" of showbiz. Thought-provoking, funny, and heartwarming, you do not want to miss this critical and audience favourite from Canada's west coast.

Ending the evening with flare will be **The (sad) Ballad of Oliver Hugh & Company**, starring Steven Bourque and notable Halifax drag-king Steph McNair as her well-known Oliver Hugh character. The story of obsession and love in a world of drag-kings and gay-boys fluctuates between fantasy and reality, exploring the key facets of drag performance and theatricality. It's a drag-inspired show that draws upon the artists' backgrounds in circus, burlesque, performance, visual art, and theatre. Put another way, it's going to be a wild time you don't want to miss.

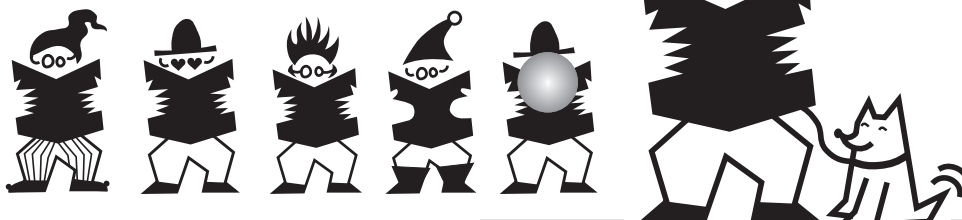
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A Mother's View: Celebrating 20 Years of Pride

Recently my daughter reminded me that we are celebrating 20 years of going to Pride together. My first Gay Pride parade, which was more of a march than a parade, was in Ottawa the summer of 1990, when my daughter was eight. She happily tagged along with me for that first Pride and for many after.

Our first Pride finished in a lovely park with everyone sitting around enjoying some entertainment and catching up with friends. It was small in comparison to today's Prides but it very exciting and joyful. However, the picnic was spoiled by a small

group of guys standing outside a fence throwing eggs into the picnic area. Police were lined up to separate us and them. For safety reasons, we immediately left. Unfortunately, that memory stayed with both of us over the years but it does serve as a reminder of how far we have come as a community and how things have changed for the better in society.

We were often harassed by extreme religious fundamentalists who paraded up and down the sidelines with huge placards telling us we were going to hell. The "evils" of AIDS and gay life were extolled and it was hard to keep our tempers in check

and stay focussed on the positive messages and images. Police escorts were provided by the city in case there was any trouble.

We also had some amazing times marching in the parades over the years. One year my daughter and I helped carry a giant rainbow flag to Parliament Hill. Other years, we marched to the Supreme Court of Canada demanding our rights along with tens of thousands and eventually hundreds of thousands of other queer folks. It was exciting to be part of history and thrilling to be part of such a wonderful loving community. I should not have been so surprised

when my daughter came out as a lesbian when she was 18. Ah, like mother, like daughter!

We now enjoy Halifax Pride every year. We plan our summers around it and look forward to it with just as much excitement and joy. I encourage everyone to come out and enjoy the fun of celebrating Pride week and the parade on Saturday, July 24. There will be lots to see and do and it is a great time to catch up with old friends and meet new ones. This year there will be a Dyke March planned as part

of Halifax Pride and I hope that women will participate in large numbers. It is a chance for women to feel the power of being in the company of other wonderful, amazing dykes. Pride is a great opportunity for us to safely and publicly express our love for each other and ourselves. It is reaffirming and guaranteed to lift your spirits. So, come out, come out, wherever you are.

A Daughter's View: Celebrating 20 Years of Pride

When spring hits all I have on my mind is Pride and I get a bit nostalgic. This is my 20th year celebrating Gay Pride. My first Pride event was in Ottawa in 1990. I was eight. I remember marching down the street, because then it was a march and rally instead of a giant party/parade. It was about making a statement and changing the way people thought and lived.

My mother came out shortly before that and she brought me with her. I remember thinking "Wow! This is amazing." After the march, they held a picnic where I hung out with other children of gay parents. That was something I hadn't seen. Most of my friends had no idea my mom was

gay and their parents were straight. It was just a beautiful afternoon.

That was 1990 and beliefs were different. There we were, families and friends enjoying the sunny day when a group of people started throwing eggs. My mother got us out of there. Throughout the years, I have seen lots of homophobic behaviour but it never brought down my enjoyment of Pride. I continued to go to Pride with my mom. I held a Pride flag at the stairs of the parliament buildings; we shouted and chanted and throughout the years I watched my first rally move into a party and parade.

I came out ten years ago at 18 and I still love Pride. I have been to Pride parades and events from St. John's

to Toronto to Dallas. I have seen the progress that Pride and events like it have made in the GLBTQ community. Since moving to Halifax in 2003, I have attended Pride here in our fair city each year. I have volunteered to work booths, marched in the parade, and have spent the last couple of years standing on the sidelines and knowing that I have been a part of history in the making.

A few years ago, before it was legal to get married, my mom and her partner, their friends, myself and my partner marched in the parade all dressed in a different color of the pride flag singing, "Going to the

chapel and we're gonna get married." I have marched behind the Safe Harbour church banner and in other parades I have walked behind the float blaring the best music, dancing all the way to the end.

Pride is important, it does have a place. It's a celebration of all the hard work those before us had to do that has enabled us to be out and open and not afraid. Through my mom I learned that it was okay to believe in something and fight for what's right. This year I will be with my mom and my wife and our friends both gay and

straight, celebrating.

Without Pride events, things we take for granted today would not be, for example same-sex marriage, being able to walk down a street holding my wife's hand, even just being able to say I am gay and not be judged. This year as you walk, march, watch the parade or attend any of the events, take a minute to give thanks to those that fought for our civil rights. I will be thanking my mom for teaching me that it's okay to be who you are and to be proud of it! Happy Pride!

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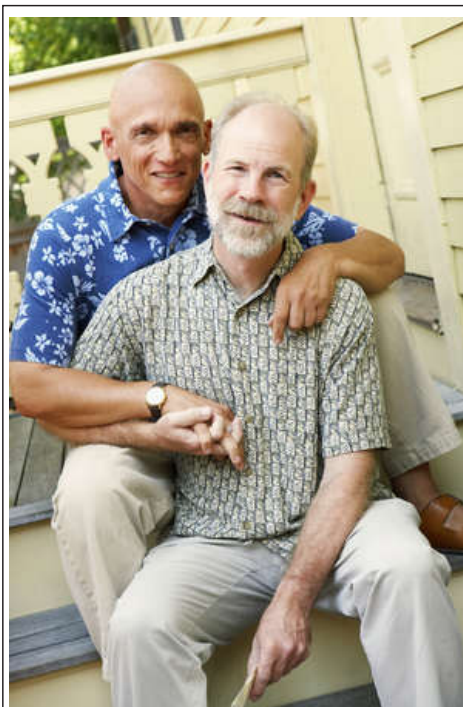
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Proud and Frederictonian

Just three years ago, Fredericton’s “Pride Week” consisted of a scattered schedule of events at the city’s only alternative lifestyle bar and its only openly gay-friendly campsite. Both

Nightclub and the Rivers Edge Campground should be applauded for carrying the flag during the years without official Pride committees, but I’m sure it eases the strain on them—and the community—to have a group of people working independently to network their projects and to create new events and offerings for those supportive of the Pride movement in and around Fredericton.

Now, after two years of sweat and glitter (and a few tears), Fredericton invites its neighboring cities and provinces to come celebrate how far we’ve come, how much the world has changed, and the way a love-based project can turn into a beautiful weeklong event filled with music, dancing, laughter and the sharing of everything from stories to eyeliner.

The weeklong festivities of Fredericton Pride 2010 begin August 8 and will run for eight days. That’s right, friends—it took us all long enough to get here that we’re making a week last eight days. We’ll start Sunday, August 8 at 3:00 p.m. with a green-friendly parade on Fredericton’s beautiful walking-trail along the Saint John River, which will start at the “old hospital” on Woodstock Road, then cross the pedestrian bridge on Carleton Street and culminate a festival of friendly faces in Officers Square on Sunday, August 8, and end with one last Naked Art Show for Pride 2010 on Sunday, August 15. This year’s Pride Festival will have a little more of something for everyone. Events will include a Family Day Amazing Race, a Drag Show, a Fashion Show (featuring local designers!), Pride Cirque de Fierté, Pride Fredericton Idol, and lots of live music. had in Fredericton.

My name is Randall and I'm addicted to home renovation shows. HGTV is my dealer; blue collar studs are my drug. Mike Holmes. Jim Caruk. Carter Oosterhouse. Brian Baeumler. John Sillaots. Kennedy McRae. My birthday is in July... you just read my wish list. Any or all of them, thank you very much. And their crews. Dressed only in workboots and toolbelt. My apartment, first thing in the morning, I plan to take the day off.

What, too much? So I'm a greedy thing when it comes to filling my eyes with guys. Nothing new. I work in a former shopping mall under conversion to a business park. The renos are ongoing and there's always a hard-hat or measuring tape or paint brush around. It's a good thing eye candy has no calories; otherwise I'd weigh a thousand pounds.

I hail from Toronto, but I grew up in a small village on the northwestern tip of P.E.I., surrounded by farmers, fishermen and men of various and sundry trades. For me, the allure was of "the other"—I was a shy and over-

(Which is not to say it's the only driver... it was, at the time, the only one to which I was quick to attune!) When I came

out I felt free to express my long-held (and pent-up) devotion for the collar coloured blue.

Truckers man-handling their rigs. Plumbers showing crack. Carpenters pounding away with their big hammers. Loggers sawing back and forth. Farmers plowing. Rubbered-up fishermen wielding their rods. Road flaggers telling me to stop, then go, then stop, then go. Mechanics greasing things up. Whole construction crews sweating and panting, backs arching and muscles straining under the weight of their loads.

(Such a filthy mind! "Please sir, I want some more," I say.)

As for me, I have very little prowess with the tools of the trades. I can navigate my way around a toolbox, for the most part. I bragged to a friend recently that I put my curtain hardware back up all by myself after the building owner changed out the windows... and then remembered said friend is a home improvement contractor and would view my little 3.6-volt electric screwdriver with amusement. "Pussy," he'd chuckle

good-heartedly, while showing me his own large screwing and drilling thingamajig. I also have a stud finder, which works very well when it comes to locating good places to hang pictures on my walls; alas it's not so good at sniffing out elusive husband material in a crowded Home Depot.

A good number of people don't know a hammer from a hole in the ground; I'm not one of them—and I'm thankful for that—but I'm not about to tackle a home reno project, despite all the tips I've picked up from watching HGTV and reading Mike Holmes magazine. Last month

June's question was, "What Atlantic Canada city is most LGBT-friendly?" The question garnered twelve responses, mostly with a single city name: Moncton – 3 votes; Saint John – 2 votes; Halifax – 1 vote; Dartmouth – 1 vote; Corner Brook – 1 vote

The four written responses were a bit more explanatory:

"Well, we know it isn't Truro!"

"Each city has a vibrant LGBT community as well as its own individual barriers to LGBT-friendliness that offset the vibrancy. Moncton may not be quite as vibrant as other cities but the barriers aren't quite as big."

"My vote would have gone to Moncton. However, after seeing the ignorance that has been displayed by not just some people but in particular a certain business within the community due to the opening of a new bar, my views have changed. I cannot believe the way people are treating each other within the community. And all because of a second bar opening which people have been asking to have for a long time."

"I don't know what it is but from my experience it is Sydney, Cape Breton. I have always gotten more harassment from the non-GLBT's in Halifax than in most other places. So my vote is for Sydney. I know stuff has happened there, but it's my home and I will love it forever."

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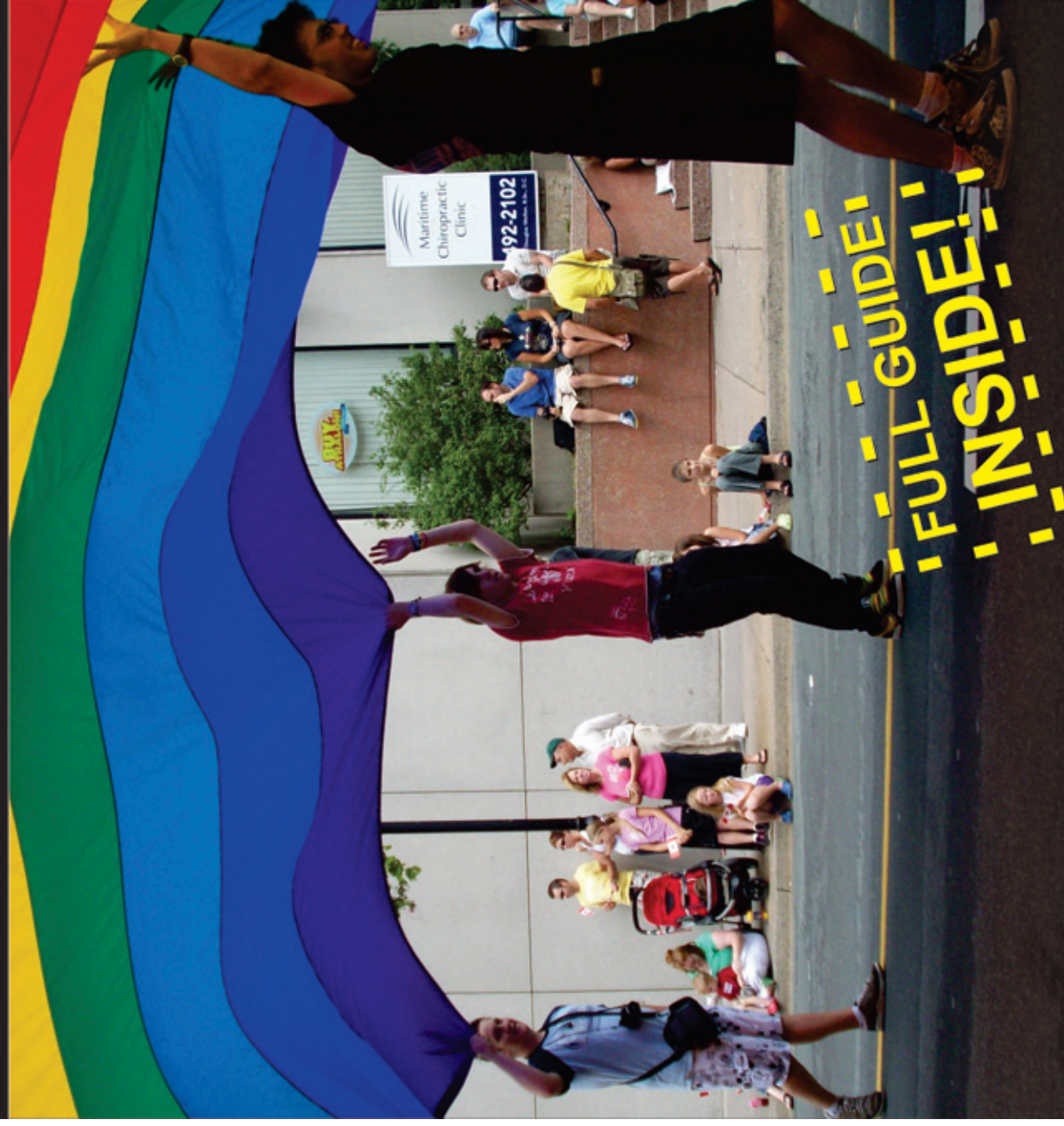
